_Grew up poor


_Apprenticed with Warren Manning (Olmsted's plantsman) before and during his studies at Harvard

For the listener, who listens in the snow, And, nothing himself, beholds Nothing that is not there and the nothing that is.
















Landscape Plan, Lot 17, Section 4, Rebecca Drive, Hollin Hills, NJ, 1954







- Project begun in early 1950's; many proposals, many denials











Orthogonal planting masses & their orientation




